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
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Dear friends,

#### **Confession and Absolution – Telling the Truth**

There's something brave about confession. To say, "I got it wrong" takes honesty—and hope. Hope that grace will meet us there.

Confession is never about shame. It's about being real with God. It's about laying down the burden of pretending and opening our hands to mercy. We say, "Lord, I missed the mark." And God says, "I know—and I love you still."

In worship, we confess together. I find comfort in that. We're not alone in our failures. We are human. And we are loved. After confession, we hear words of absolution—not because the minister is magic, but because we need to hear, out loud, that forgiveness is real.

Sometimes it helps to write things down. Sometimes it helps to speak them aloud. Always, God is ready to listen—not with judgment, but with healing.

# Update on 1st Sawston Girls' Brigade and Boys' Brigade



On Tuesday 13th May 2025 we celebrated our annual awards, presided over by our Guest of Honour and ex GB captain, Julie Robinson.

Every young person that attends Girls' Brigade or Boys' Brigade received at least one award.

Boys' Brigade award one badge per year which represents all the elements of Boys Brigade values through their areas of Get Active, Get Into the Bible, Get Creative, Get Learning, Get Adventurous and Get Involved, whereas Girls' Brigade recognise skills learnt for every 6 weeks of badge work covering specific values.

This year the youngest girls (N:vestigators) have looked at their senses in the badge called Our Bodies, as well as a Friendship and Food badge involving cooking a variety of savoury and sweet food.



For the Awards evening, they prepared a quiz for the audience which was interactive, touchy, feely and smelly!

The Juniors, now called N:gage, worked to gain their badges on Trust, Courage and Sharing.

Each badge focuses on a Biblical figure and for their Courage badge, we looked at Paul and his missionary journeys, linking it with the World Day of Prayer and the Cook Islands.

We looked at the letters that Paul wrote to the early Christians and for our Awards evening, they told us about Paul's courage in sharing the love of Christ, encouraging and inspiring followers.

The Senior girls, now called N:Counta have worked hard this year to earn their badges of Girls' Brigade Values, Creativity and Entertaining.

For the Creativity badge, they made up and performed a worship dance following a visit from a dance leader from C3 church which they recorded and we watched at the Awards evening.

Not only that, they planned, prepared and cooked a 3 course vegetarian meal for parents and invited guests.

Helped by Mary Simuyandi and Sue Sisk, the menu included cocktails on arrival with canapés of smoked salmon or cucumber blennies.

The main course was butternut squash and lentil curry with rice, finished off with blondies and home made caramel fudge ice cream.

It was a delicious evening and the girls definitely earned their Entertaining badge.



The younger boys, Anchors, used the letters of Anchors to tell us about some of the activities they get up to on a Tuesday evening.

The Junior boys rose to the challenge of building a tent in just over 3 minutes which was impressive to say the least! Lots of teamwork involved to get the poles in the right place!

Julie Robinson shook each of the 30 youngsters hands when they received their badges and awards. After all of them had been handed out, she spoke about the skills gained by coming to Girls' Brigade and Boys' Brigade that will help them in many walks of life.

She recalled seeing the Girls' Brigade and Boys' Brigade band parading behind the armed forces at the recent commemorations of 80 years since VE day and demonstrated to the youngsters that they are part of an international organisation that they should be proud to belong to.

Rev Phil also added his congratulations to all the youngsters being awarded, and told us that there was a scroll that the Junior girls had missed - he produced a scroll that Paul had written and started reading it - in Greek!

Thankfully he translated it for us which is on the following page. It sums up how lucky we are to have leaders, families and youngsters who come each week to Brigades and fill the church building with laughter, learning and love.

Hopefully the message that God is for all of us and he loves each one of us will hold firm in many hearts.

# As I see it ... by Mike Wilson

#### Wesley House – Mk 3

On Saturday 21<sup>st</sup> June, Margaret and I attended the last public occasion at Wesley House, the Methodist College on Jesus Lane. In October, the House will re-open at its new location, a rented commercial office suite on Castle Mound. The worship was strong, confident, and joyful. We praised God for all that is past, and proclaimed our trust in all that is to come.

The House was funded and founded in the 1920s by Michael Gutteridge and his friends, whose vision was for the (then) Wesleyan Methodist Church to have a cadre of ministers trained to the highest academic standards at what he regarded as the centre of the secular world's intellectual attack on the Christian religion – the University of Cambridge. His vision was that thereby the Wesleyans would have voices able to stand up to all the secular world could throw at them. It also put the Wesleyans shoulder to shoulder with the Church of England and the Presbyterians, who already had colleges in Cambridge. A very cramped site was purchased from Jesus College, with Jesus College retaining a first-interest should the site ever go back on the market.

Wesley House was from the start anti-elitist. Its' alumni went where every Methodist minister went, to rich and poor alike, and to every corner of Britain and the world. Among them was Margaret's father, Paul Jefferies, who went out to China in 1942, and was pitched into first the war with Japan and then the Chinese Revolutionary War. His name is still revered in Hunan. He is one of many.

For all its noble vision, it has to be admitted that Wesley House was also something of a vanity project. It was built to mimic the Cambridge style. As a building, it was cold and, for all the high-quality materials used, it was grossly inefficient and expensive to maintain. In addition, putting students through the Cambridge degree system was (and is) extremely expensive. Thus some fifteen years ago a cash-strapped Methodist Church decided that it could no longer afford to use Cambridge as an initial training college, and withdrew all its students.

The college trustees decided to re-envisage the Gutteridge vision for the modern age. Having no money except the building itself, they sold the entire site back to Jesus College, and then took a 100-year lease-back on a peppercorn rent on one third of the site, together with a hefty cash component, which they spent mainly on adapting what they were left with into the present college.

The new international post-graduate college for the promotion of Wesleyan Theology did very well. Students came from all over the world for residential courses, some to do doctoral degrees, and all to study how Wesleyan insights could assist their home churches apply the Christian faith for the healing of their modern context. Often these contexts were tragic, even violent. To sit listening to these wonderful women and men talking about home at community evening meals was both thrilling and humbling. Throughout this period, two trends emerged: the numbers of students on-line grew steadily together with the number of courses being delivered online, and Wesley staff increasingly jetted around the world to

deliver Wesley House courses in universities and seminaries around the world – but primarily in the USA and various African countries.

Then came Covid. Covid changed *everything* - not just for Wesley House, and not just for every theological training college in the world, but for every college and university around the world. Indeed, as the world emerged from Covid, it became clear that, world-wide, just about everything to do with how we human beings associate with each other had changed from the simple task of shopping, onwards. In education, it is thought that over one hundred universities in Britain are currently drastically restructuring in a bid to avoid bankruptcy. (The professor from Washington whom I sat next to last Saturday told me that it is exactly the same in the USA.) For Wesley House, it became clear that we had built a fine college to do a wonderful job for us, but that the job it was built to do no longer existed. The Wesley House Trustees faced exactly the same issues as everyone else – empty premises, no students in residence, no income from rentals, and bankruptcy.

Believing that the current situation could only get worse rather than better, the Trustees decided that the sooner they made their decision the better. They realised that what was killing them wasn't the cost of delivering the courses, but the cost of maintaining the building. (How many congregations struggle week-in week-out with the fact that their building is killing them?) Accordingly, they operated the buy-back clause built into the lease from Jesus College, pocketed a considerable sum of money, and rented cheap (by Cambridge standards) efficient office accommodation into which they will move over the summer in time to open for business in October. When they have conferences to host, they will rent from the colleges round about. When they have students in residence, they will rent accommodation for them on the market. And when they don't, they will continue to deliver their courses on-line, around the country, and around the world.

Why stay in Cambridge when almost anywhere else would be cheaper? Partly because Michael Gutteridge's bequest, which still governs the college, is for it to be 'within the confines of the University of Cambridge.' But far more importantly, the House is still part of the Cambridge Theological Federation, which is a massively influential and important body for debate within and beyond the ecumenical church. Also, the House still has its relationship with the University as an affiliated college, and still contributes to, and can give its students access to, all the thrilling, influential debate (especially in the inter-faith understanding) that goes on there. And thirdly, as we were advised by a management consultant fifteen years ago when deciding whether and how it might be possible to stay in business, 'Cambridge is the biggest selling point you have.'

Today, the House has more students than ever before. Most of them will, in all probability, never come to Cambridge. That is the modern world. But, they will have 'Cambridge' on their CVs, which will help them professionally, and, far more importantly, they will have been fashioned in the vigorous, biblical, reconciling, liberal, peace-making and generous Wesleyan theology that the House has always taught.

As I type this out (late again!) for our amazingly patient editor, I have at the back of my mind the word of Jesus that I shall preach on next Sunday (29<sup>th</sup> June): Luke 9:62, 'No-one who puts a hand to the plough and ploughs looking backwards is fit for the kingdom of God.'

#### **God Calling**

Many years ago my dear Aunty Mable (always known as Mabs) gave me a well worn copy of 'God Calling' and of course I thanked her for it. I didn't realise at the time how much I would rely on it and how much I would value it, to this day. It eventually fell to pieces.

While visiting my parents I came across a Christian book shop and asked the assistant, "if by chance she knew how I could get another copy of this wonderful little book." "Yes", she said. "How many would you like?"

I bought quite a few and gave them to friends. Now, you can buy it on Amazon! It was written by two woman who wished to remain anonymous, only to be called "two listeners". A J Russell had it published many years ago and it continues to be reprinted. ISBN 978-1-55748-110-8 PS:

It was my dear Aunty Mabs who told me about Jesus when I was little and sparked my Christian journey, I adored her and she lived to 99, just a few months short of 100!

#### How Men See Me

I came to help a world. And according to the varying needs of each so does each man see Me.

It is not necessary that you see Me as others see Me—the world, even the Church,

## 1 Timothy Study part 2 – Living the Gospel in Daily Life (Phil Nevard)

In chapter 2, Paul moves from the big picture to everyday life. His first instruction is simple but powerful: "First of all, then, I urge that supplications, prayers, intercessions, and thanksgivings be made for everyone."

This kind of praying shapes a community. It stretches our hearts beyond our own needs. And it places us in an attitude of peace—so that, as Paul says, we might live "a quiet and peaceable life in all godliness and dignity."

There's a practical holiness here. A call to be the kind of people whose faith is visible not through shouting, but through steadiness. Through prayer. Through kindness. Through quiet trust.

This chapter also contains verses that, for many, raise difficult questions about gender roles and leadership. It's okay to wrestle with scripture. What's important is to do so with care, with humility, and with a heart tuned to the gospel of Jesus—who honoured women, welcomed outsiders, and overturned assumptions.

Let's not miss the thread running through the whole chapter: God "desires everyone to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth." Our task, then, is not to create barriers, but to build bridges.

Faith lived out is not just a Sunday matter. It shows up in how we speak, how we treat others, how we pray, how we carry ourselves in the ordinary moments.

#### **Savoury muffin bake-off**

Do you fancy a savoury muffin bake-off? At Messy Church (1st July) our young guests under Lucy's guidance joined together to make a single batch of savoury muffins which they thoroughly enjoyed as part of their tea at the end of Messy Church. The following Sunday (Pentecost) at our bring-and-share lunch Matthew made Welsh rarebit muffins which seemed to go down well.

Below are the recipes that were used for both of these savoury muffins, so you can try them for yourselves.

#### Lucy's Messy Church Muffins (based on a recipe from Sarah Rossi):

- 250 g Self-raising flour
- 1 tsp Baking powder
- 1 tsp Salt
- 200 g Grated cheese
- 1 carrot (grated)
- 1 red pepper (deseeded and chopped)

Preheat the oven to 200°C/400F fan, 220°C/425F or Gas Mark 7.

In a large bowl mix the dry ingredients including the cheese, carrot and red pepper.

In a separate bowl mix the wet ingredients.

Add the wet ingredients to the dry ingredients and mix until just combined, then put the mixture in 12 muffin cases in muffin trays. Bake for 20 to 25 minutes.

#### Matthew's Welsh Rarebit muffins (based on a BBC Good Food recipe):

- 225g self-raising flour
- 50g plain flour
- 1 tsp baking powder
- ½ level tsp bicarbonate of soda
- ¼ tsp salt
- 100g strong cheese, half grated, half cubed

• 90ml vegetable oil

2 Eggs, Beaten

milk

100 ml Oil, Sunflower or vegetable

250 ml Milk, Semi-skimmed or whole

- 150g Greek yogurt
- 125ml milk
- 1 egg
- 1 tbsp Worcestershire sauce
- 6 cherry tomatoes cut in half

Preheat the oven to 180°C fan, 200°C or Gas Mark 6.

In a large bowl mix the dry ingredients including the cheese but not the half tomatoes. In a separate bowl mix the wet ingredients.

Add the wet ingredients to the dry ingredients and mix until just combined, then put the mixture in 12 muffin cases in muffin trays. Put half a cherry tomato on each muffin. Bake for 20 to 25 minutes.

In a proper bake-off, the judges should be able to see and taste the muffins at the same time. This might be a bit challenging on your own, but you could consider inviting someone else to make the muffins following the other recipe so you can judge them together. Alternatively I think that both of these muffins freeze well so you could make separate batches for the freezer and defrost some of each type for a proper comparison. **Enjoy!**

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
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
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
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#### The Footprints Café
