

A Short Series On Prayer Petition – Asking with Honesty (Phil Nevard)

Asking can feel vulnerable. Whether it's help, healing, strength, or clarity—we worry we're asking too much, or not the right way. But Jesus said, "Ask." Not because we twist God's arm—but because we're children, and children are allowed to ask.

Petition is where prayer gets personal. It's where we bring what's really going on: the fears, the questions, the daily bread we need. And God listens—not with impatience, but with compassion.

We won't always get the answer we want. But that doesn't mean God hasn't heard. Sometimes, the answer is peace. Sometimes, it's a slow unfolding. Sometimes, it's strength to get through the day.

Don't hold back. Say it plainly. "Lord, I'm tired." "Please help me through this." "Be near." These are good prayers.

And maybe, in time, we begin to see that the asking itself is a gift. It reminds us we are not abandoned. We are held.

A question:

What do I need from God right now?

A response:

Ask. Say it simply. Then rest in the knowledge that God hears—and cares.



Boys Will Be Boys

In recent years, the response to the girls out-performing the boys at school has been 'Good for the girls! Boys, you need to buck up!' This year the tables have, in part, been turned. Far from expressing praise, the headlines have reflected an outraged suspicion that the system has been re-jigged to favour boys. Of 'Well done, boys!' – not a sound.

Also in recent years there has been a growing concern that we are creating a culture in which boys are not criticised for what they might say or do, but for what they are — male.

As I write this, there are disturbing reports about national flags being put up in our streets by young men proclaiming 'love, unity and patriotism.' The fear is that they are proclaiming nothing of the sort. (https://www.bbc.co.uk/news/articles/cx271162ee3o)

The Persephone Press has just re-published Sylvia Carson's *Crooked Cross* (1934) about the disaffected pre-war German youth and the rise of fascism. (The 'Crooked Cross' is the Swastika.) Carson based her novel (currently being serialised in BBC Sounds) on her visits to her German friends. It is. She was an ignored prophet. Consider this dialogue:

"'Do you want another war, Helmy?' asked Frau Kluger quietly, keeping her eyes on the bread she was cutting.

'I don't know,' he answered miserably. 'I don't know what I want. I want something — we all want something — we all want to be somebody, want to have something — make something.'

'You mean you all want to break something,' broke in Lexa sharply. 'And when you've broken everything you can touch – what d'you think you'll do then?'"

Young men *need* a way in which they can be somebody, have something, and make something — a way in which they can earn their self-respect. Otherwise, Carson warned, they will break things. She was horribly correct. Having broken things, they broke people - 50 to 80 million of them, depending on how you count.

Are we currently re-seeing Carson's nightmare in its initial stages right across Western Society, and in particular here in Britain? 'Of course not!' we say. That's what we said in 1934. I ask myself 'What have we Christians to say?' and answer, 'Very little.' That too was true of 1934. Why are we Christians so silent? Because we lack the words we need.

The Old Testament stereotype for manhood is primarily that of the Davidic noble warrior. In inter-testamental times this image was glorified into the Son-of-Man, the semi-divine hero leading the celestial hosts and sweeping all before him. An unresolved question running through the New Testament is, 'Is Jesus this God-Man warrior?' It has remained unresolved. Why? Because, I believe, we Christians find the tensions presented by Jesus unbearable. Rather than seek true resolution, we warp him to our will.

Victorian Britain proclaimed 'Muscular Christianity' to the world. 'Nothing wrong with power,' we said, 'Provided it is in good Christian hands.' Putin and Trump would say as much. The Nazis, having dressed Jesus in Teutonic clothes, said the same.

Can the New Testament Jesus be forced into this Divine Hero image? Of course. But at a price. What about Jesus the healer, reconciler, forgiver, shepherd, restorer, peace-maker, servant, sufferer, champion of the weak and the poor, friend of women, ... the list goes on? 'No problem,' says the Muscular Christian. 'Victory first, then all those other things.' That, I believe, isn't Christianity at all. If that is right, Jesus died for nothing.

Healer, reconciler, forgiver, shepherd etc., the problem, it seems to me, is that none of these images reflects how today's young man instinctively wants to think of himself, nor what today's young woman instinctively looks for in a young man (though after bitter experience she may well come to value gentleness over muscularity). As a result, Christians, then as now, choose between preaching a form of Muscular Christianity – because it is attractive (surprisingly, for women as much as men) - and being helplessly silent in the face of the rising tide of discontent and disaffection in our society.

Over the last fifty years, Christian women, reflecting patterns in secular society, have discovered an entirely new vocabulary in which to express their womanhood and their place in society. Christian feminism is not to be under-estimated or under-valued. It is a mighty theological success, and is to be celebrated. What is not sufficiently remarked upon is that it has been achieved, in significant part, as it has in wider secular society, through implacable opposition to the conventional understanding of what it is to be male.

'It's up to the men, isn't it?' No, it isn't! We will only discover the folly of that when it is too late. Already, in some parts of the church, men, mirroring wider society, are striving to put women back in their box. In such churches, women are allowed in the pulpit to dust, but not to lead. Surprisingly, there are Christian women welcoming this. Presumably, they like being broken by 'Christian' men. Less surprisingly, 'Christian' men like breaking them.

More thoughtful Christian people need, I believe, to discover a new social contract in which all people can be proud to what they are, and everyone can be proud of each other. The nearest thing I can think of is the (sadly, largely fictional) Mediaeval Code of Chivalry. At its theoretical best, it provided a Christian framework in which everyone knew exactly what they had to do to hold themselves (and be held by society) in honour. Only when it failed did the men resort to breaking things.

In such a new code, the image of Jesus as healer, reconciler, forgiver, shepherd, restorer, peace-maker, sufferer, and servant would emerge as genuinely attractive and formative, offering men and women a way 'to be somebody, want to have something — make something.' And the image of manhood promoted by the Tate brothers, in which breaking things is glorified, would be utterly despised as the intellectually and spiritually impoverished thing it is.

Amen, Come Lord Jesus!

1 Timothy Study (Phil Nevard)

The final chapters of 1 Timothy offer a mix of warning and encouragement. Paul urges Timothy to stand firm, to keep teaching, to avoid endless arguments, and to hold onto what is good.

There's a realism in Paul's tone. Some will walk away from faith. Some will chase after wealth, or novelty, or power. But Timothy is called to be different: "pursue righteousness, godliness, faith, love, endurance, gentleness."

These are slow-growing virtues. They don't happen overnight. But they are what help us stay faithful, especially when life is hard.

Paul's advice to the rich also rings true today: "Do not be haughty, or set your hopes on the uncertainty of riches, but... be rich in good works, generous, and ready to share." That's not just advice for the wealthy. It's an invitation to all of us—to hold things lightly, to give freely, to trust deeply.

In the final verses, Paul entrusts Timothy with a powerful charge: "guard what has been entrusted to you." Each of us carries something precious—the story of God's love, the light of Christ, the call to be salt in the world. We don't carry it alone, but we do carry it faithfully.

Faithfulness doesn't always look dramatic. Sometimes it's just showing up. Praying again. Serving quietly. Loving anyway.

What helps you stay grounded when life gets overwhelming?

Simple response:

Write down one practice or prayer that helps you return to God. Keep it close this week.


